

CASE NO. 1:09-1330-CONNER

1. I am over the age of 18. I make this declaration based upon my personal knowledge.
2. I am a graduate gemologist and jewelry appraiser and provide, among other things, jewelry appraisal services through the company, Lones Gemologists & Appraisers, Inc., located in Coral Gables, Florida, of which I am the President.
3. I was retained by the court-appointed Receiver in the above-styled actions (the "Receiver") to inspect certain jewelry and watches which the Receiver's counsel, Kenneth Dante Murena, informed me that the Receiver had seized from the residence of Defendant Sean Nathan Healy and Relief Defendant Shalese Healy (collectively, the "Healys") on July 13, 2009, and other jewelry and watches that had been turned over by the Healys, through their bodyguard Tim Cash, to the Receiver on July 30, 2009. Hereinafter, all such jewelry and watches will be referred to the "Healy Jewelry".
4. I have personally inspected all of the Healy Jewelry for the purpose of identifying each piece and determining its authenticity and fair market value.
5. In particular, I inspected what resembled 4.75 to 5.00 carat diamond-like stud earring with plastic fastener, which Mr. Murena informed had been turned over to the Receiver by Mr. Cash on July 30, 2009.
6. Using a diamond tester for thermal conductivity and a jeweler's loupe, I determined, based on my expertise and experience in identifying diamonds and other precious and semi-precious stones, that this stud earring did not contain a genuine diamond or any precious or semi-precious stone. In fact, I believe that stone is cubic zirconia or other simulated diamond and, therefore,

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the earring has an estimated fair market value of \$ 0.00 for the stone.

7. Further, I also inspected what appeared to be a diamond-encrusted charm (for a necklace) in the shape of a cross. Mr. Murena had informed me that the Receiver had seized this item from the Healy's residence on July 13, 2009.
8. Using a diamond tester for thermal conductivity and a jeweler's loupe, I determined, based on my expertise and experience in identifying diamonds and other precious and semi-precious stones, that this charm did not contain any genuine diamonds or any precious or semi-precious stones. In fact, I believe that stones on this charm were cubic zirconia or other simulated diamond , and, therefore, the charm has an estimated fair market value of \$0.00. for the stones.
